Chapter 1

1-1. Purpose. To establish policies and procedures for the control and security of privately owned weapons and ammunition, and to delineate prohibited items.

1-2. Applicability. This regulation applies to all persons entering or on the Fort Bragg (FB) reservation.

1-3. General.

a. Military personnel who fail to comply with chapters 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 9, or 10 of this regulation are subject to judicial or nonjudicial action under the Uniformed Code of Military Justice (UCMJ), or appropriate administrative action.

b. Government employees and civilians who violate chapters 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 9, or 10 of this regulation may be subject to prosecution in the United States Magistrate Court, barred from post, referred to civilian authorities, or subject to disciplinary and administrative action according to appropriate civilian personnel regulations.

c. Weapons used, possessed, transported, or stored in violation of this regulation may be temporarily seized or permanently confiscated.

d. The provisions of this regulation do not replace or relieve individuals of their responsibility to comply with applicable federal, state, and local laws and statutes regarding possession, purchase, sale, transfer, or transport of weapons.

e. North Carolina law that authorizes licensed individuals to carry concealed handguns, does not apply on the Fort Bragg reservation. Under no circumstances will the transportation of loaded or concealed handguns, shotguns, or rifles be permitted on Fort Bragg except by duly authorized law enforcement personnel or by military personnel in the performance of their official duties.

Chapter 2

2-1. Responsibilities.

a. Provost Marshal.

(1) Conduct local records checks on service members applying for permits to purchase firearms.

(2) Operate and maintain weapon registry program.

b. Commanders.

(1) Secure weapons and ammunition in locked containers separate from military arms, ammunition, and explosives (AA&E).

(2) Use procedures in AR 710-2 dated 31 Oct 97 (Supply Policy Below Wholesale Level) to account for and inventory weapons and ammunition.

(3) Post on unit bulletin boards applicable local regulations, state, and local law information on weapons and ammunition.

(4) Notify the Military Police (MP) Desk Sergeant immediately upon discovery of loss of accountability of privately owned firearms stored in the unit arms room.

(5) Conduct periodic barracks inspections to ensure compliance with this regulation.

c. Any person with knowledge regarding the loss, theft, or recovery of a privately owned weapon will notify the Military Police Desk Sergeant immediately.

Chapter 3

3-1. Personal Firearms and Prohibited Acts/Items on Fort Bragg.

a. It is unlawful for any person to:

(1) Fail to register, store, or transport a firearm in violation of this regulation.

(2) Possess an item prohibited by this regulation.

b. In addition to the above, it is prohibited for a service member to purchase a firearm without first complying with the requirements of chapter 7 of this regulation.

Chapter 4

4-1. Transportation of Firearms on the Installation. No person may transport a firearm on Fort Bragg unless the weapon is registered in accordance with chapter 6 of this regulation, they are in possession

of their FB Form 1381, and the following requirements are met:

a. The individual is directly transporting (without stopping at intermediate locations) the firearm from or to a place of authorized storage, from or to hunting areas, firing ranges, gun or repair shops or locations authorized in writing by the unit commander; or, the individual is traversing Fort Bragg from one off-post location to another off-post location using a publicly traveled roadway, without stopping within the confines of the installation.

b. Firearms shall be transported in the following manner:

(1) The firearm must be unloaded and transported in a compartment of the vehicle that is inaccessible to passengers in the vehicle. In all cases, ammunition will be transported in a separate compartment from the one in which the weapon is stored. If no inaccessible area exists, the firearm will be unloaded and transported in open view and the ammunition stored separately. A firearm in a closed case is considered in open view if it otherwise complies with the provisions above. In all cases ammunition will be inaccessible to the weapon.

(2) Firearms used for hunting on Fort Bragg ranges, as defined in FB Regulation (Reg) 420-11, para 1-5, may be transported in the passenger compartment of a vehicle as long as they are unloaded and cased, and only while the possessor of the weapon(s) is actively engaged in hunting as defined in FB Reg 420-11, para 2-3a. As an exception, muzzleloaders may be transported with a round in the chamber as long as the weapons firing cap or flint is removed rendering it unable to fire.

Chapter 5

5-1. Storage of Firearms on the Installation.

a. Privately owned firearms shall only be stored in family housing, with the Fort Bragg Military Police, or in unit arms rooms.

(1) Storage in Family Housing. Service members occupying family housing may store privately owned firearms and ammunition in their homes provided that the weapon is registered in accordance with (IAW) this regulation. Both firearms and ammunition must be stored in a secured locked container. Individuals storing privately owned firearms and ammunition in family housing are to ensure that all reasonable precautions are taken to ensure firearms and ammunition are inaccessible to unauthorized persons and minors.

(2) Temporary Storage with Fort Bragg Military Police. Official and unofficial visitors with no affiliation to any unit or organization on Fort Bragg are required to surrender privately owned firearms to the Provost Marshal for temporary safekeeping. Firearms will be turned in to the MP Desk, building I-2539. Prior notification with the MP Desk Sergeant (SGT) is required before presenting weapons to the MP Desk. The Desk Sergeant can be reached at (910) 396-0391/0392. Firearms may not, under any circumstances, be stored in transient quarters.

(3) Individuals residing in transient quarters and individuals other than those specified in chapter 5 must store privately owned firearms and ammunition in the unit arms room of the unit to which they are, or will be, assigned or attached.

(4) Commanders at all levels have the authority to require any individual living on post within their command to surrender his or her privately owned firearms for storage in the unit's arms room when, in their opinion, the continued presence of firearms in the service member's residence threatens the good order, discipline or safety of the unit, the individual or dependents of the individual in question.

b. Units to which newly arrived or temporary duty personnel (TDY) are assigned/attached are responsible for the storage of their weapons and ammunition. Commanders must ensure that their unit Standard Operating Procedures (SOP) addresses receipt and storage of weapons and ammunition after normal duty hours.

Chapter 6

6-1. Fort Bragg Firearm Registration Requirements.

a. All individuals residing on the installation, to include family members, must register all firearms they own or possess that are located on Fort Bragg. In addition, all persons prior to transporting weapons onto Fort Bragg for hunting, target practice or sporting events, must register their weapons using FB Form 1381. The weapon does not need to be present at time of registration. The registrant must provide the make, model and serial number of the weapon. Persons stopped and found to have inaccurate or misleading data will be considered in violation of this regulation. All persons will keep their copy of Fort Bragg Form 1381 on their person when in actual transport of weapons as proof of compliance with this regulation and will produce the same to any Military Policemen or other Federal Law Enforcement Officer, to include Fish and Game Personnel on Fort Bragg, when so requested. Registration for installation residents must occur within 5 working days from the time

the individual begins to reside on Fort Bragg or from the time a new firearm is purchased, acquired, or legally disposed of. Official and unofficial visitors who intend to remain on the installation for 5 days or less are not required to register their firearms, but must store their firearms with the Military Police as stated in chapter 5-1.a.(2). Service members who have registered their weapons and are leaving Fort Bragg on Permanent Changes of Station (PCS) or End Tour of Service (ETS) orders will advise the PMO by notifying any of the Vehicle/Weapons Registration Points of their departure and of their new duty station if applicable. The PMO Stamp will then be affixed on their clearing papers.

b. Procedures to Register:

(1) Obtain and complete FB Form 1381, Weapons Registration Form (sample at Appendix B). Forms will be made available for soldiers, commanders, and individuals electronically or at the Vehicle Registration locations on Fort Bragg. Forms may also be obtained by sending a self-addressed stamped envelope to Public Safety Business Center, ATTN: Weapons Registration, Fort Bragg, NC 28310. Dependent civilians residing with service members on post will also register their weapons using FB Form 1381. The word dependent will be marked across the top of the form. In the case of Department of the Army civilians living on the installation, they will use their respective agency as their unit.

(2) Return the completed forms to any Vehicle/Weapons Registration location for data entry. The applicant will be given the bottom half of the form with the PMO stamp indicating compliance with the regulation. As new firearms are purchased, acquired, or sold, the individual is required to return within 5 working days to update his record.

Chapter 7

7-1. Purchase of firearms by service members. (Rifle or Shotgun)

a. Service members must complete FB Form 1380, Application for Authority to Purchase a Firearm (sample at Appendix B), prior to the purchase of any firearm. Applicants may obtain a copy of FB Form 1380 from the Police Services section of the PMO. The PMO will do a local records check to determine any previous violations and note this information on the form at this time. Applicants will then submit the FB Form 1380 to their company/battery commander for signature. Commanders are the granting authority for permission to purchase. Battalion commanders will act as appellate authority. The PMO records check is only for the purpose of listing prior violations for the commander's attention. The determination of granting permission for

this action in all cases is vested in the individual's commander. Commanders should consider the reliability, stability, maturity, and disciplinary record of applicants when granting permission. (See Appendix B) The commander will make a copy of the form and maintain it in the service member's file until PCS. The form will then be returned to the PMO for a second local background check and PMO stamp. A copy of the FB Form 1380 is retained by the PMO and the applicant is given the original. The applicant may now present this form to any licensed firearms dealer for a purchase of a rifle or shotgun here in North Carolina.

b. Purchase of Handguns: Service members wishing to purchase a handgun must comply with all measures listed in chapter 7-1(a) in regards to FB Form 1380. In addition to the completed FB Form 1380, service members who seek to purchase handguns must present the PMO stamped FB Form 1380 to their respective North Carolina Sheriff's Department in order to obtain a North Carolina Handgun Purchaser's Permit.

c. Service members must at all times comply with applicable state and federal regulations governing the sale or transfer of firearms. Nothing in this regulation is meant to relieve a service member of the obligation of following all state and federal statutes in regards to sales, transfers, or possession of firearms.

Chapter 8

8-1. Exceptions.

a. Nothing in this regulation shall prohibit:

(1) Service members or government employees from possessing or using military weapons, military ammunition or explosives, or other military devices, while in the performance of official duties, for training, or for other authorized purposes as prescribed by applicable Army Regulations.

(2) Civilian law enforcement personnel, while in the performance of official law enforcement duties, from possessing or using government or privately owned weapons, ammunition, explosives or other devices in a lawful manner, as prescribed by applicable laws or the orders of lawful superiors.

(3) Government contract employees, while in the performance of their contract, from possessing or using weapons, ammunition, explosives or other devices IAW the provisions of their contract and as determined by the Contracting Officer.

(4) Individuals with a Class III Federal Firearms License from possessing or transporting Class III weapons IAW federal regulations.

(5) Individuals from possessing, carrying, transporting, or storing decorative, ornamental, or ceremonial swords and sabers within the confines of the installation when used strictly for display and ceremonies. When used as a weapon they become prohibited items.

(6) Authorized carriers of household goods and authorized carriers for the Army and Air Force Exchange Services (AAFES) or Outdoor Recreation from transporting on post any weapon contained in the household goods or ordered by AAFES/Outdoor Recreation.

(7) Persons holding valid North Carolina Concealed Weapons Permits will be allowed to traverse public highways through Fort Bragg as long as they are not stopping within the installation. State Permits are not recognized on the installation, as it is federal property. Except when traversing through the installation, all persons must comply with all the provisions of this regulation. Carry of concealed weapons on the installation is strictly prohibited.

b. The Garrison Commander must grant any other waiver to the requirements of this regulation. Any such request must be made in writing and the approved requests filed with the PMO.

Chapter 9

9-1. Prohibited Items and Prohibited Acts.

a. Except as otherwise provided, the following items are prohibited on Fort Bragg and deemed contraband subject to confiscation:

(1) Prohibited Knives: Fixed blade knives having a cutting edge in excess of two and a half inches, except when carried openly in the pursuit of a lawful purpose such as hunting and fishing. Any stiletto, switchblade, gravity knife, bowie knife, sword, or spear is prohibited. Nothing in this prohibition is meant to apply to household utensils such as kitchen knives, ice picks, scissors, meat cleavers, carpet knives, pocket knives with blades up to five inches in length, wood working tools, and other similar items when they are used for their intended lawful purposes. Tomahawks, swords, or other similar items are also exempt from this definition when used exclusively for ornamental, ceremonial, or sporting purposes.

(2) Brass knuckles or any similar device fitting over or concealed in the hand, including knuckle knives.

(3) Numchucks, throwing stars, shurikins, throwing spikes, and samurai swords.

(4) Blackjacks, slappers, saps, riot clubs, night sticks, lead or iron pipes, rubber or plastic hoses wrapped with tape or filled with sand or lead buckshot, or any other similar devices, except riot clubs and night sticks when carried by duly constituted law enforcement officials in the line of duty.

(5) Razors, ice picks, box cutters, screwdrivers, or other similar devices and tools when carried concealed or for use as a weapon.

(6) Explosives, incendiary, and pyrotechnic devices including fireworks, except when approved for use by the Garrison Commander.

(7) Homemade percussion-type weapons.

(8) Incapacitating Gas or Liquid: Teargas, mace, pepper mace or any similar type of incapacitating liquid or gas, except when carried for personal protection and when the capacity does not exceed 50 cubic centimeters.

(9) Concealed Weapons or Loaded Firearms: A concealed weapon is one that is deemed covered or hidden from sight, e.g., a weapon secreted upon the person or hidden from sight or detection anywhere in the vehicle to include any compartment within the entire passenger area of a vehicle. Any weapon with any ammunition in the breech, chamber, cylinder, magazine, or other loading mechanism attached to the weapon shall be considered loaded for the purposes of this regulation.

(10) Prohibited Storage: Any privately owned firearm stored in violation of this regulation.

(11) Drug paraphernalia: Drug paraphernalia is anything used to introduce into the body, manufacture, weigh, or package, a controlled substance that is unlawful to possess according to Federal or State drug laws.

(12) Armor-Piercing Ammunition: Any ammunition that has been designed, manufactured or adapted for the purpose of defeating metal armor of any type or soft body armor such as worn by law enforcement personnel.

(13) Silencers: Any device so designed or adapted to reduce the noise levels coming from any type of firearm when fired.

(14) Automatic Weapons: Any firearm capable of firing continuously with only one application of the trigger mechanism using any form of mechanical or gas energy.

b. Air rifles, air pistols, slingshots, spear guns, cross bows, long bows, compound bows, blowguns, paint-ball guns or other missile launching devices must be stored IAW Chapter 5 of this regulation. No registration is required. Use of these devices is prohibited except in locations so designated by the Garrison Commander. The provisions of chapter 4 also apply to the transport of these devices. Nothing in this regulation is meant to prevent the official use of any of these devices to aid in unit or individual proficiency training or for hunting/fishing when regulations so permit.

Chapter 10

10-1. Safety.

a. Individuals less than 18 years of age will not transport or use privately owned firearms on the installation unless accompanied by an adult. Minors on Fort Bragg may not register weapons.

b. Individuals will be held responsible to maintain all privately owned firearms in a safe operating condition so as not to present a hazard to themselves or others while in use on the installation.

c. Individuals will not take privately owned weapons or ammunition into any barracks except in a direct line between the building entrance and the unit arms room.

d. Disposition of seized contraband. All privately owned weapons, ammunition, and prohibited items seized pursuant to this regulation, will be treated as evidence of a crime. Seized contraband will be processed in accordance with AR 195-5, Evidence Procedures, 28 Aug 92.

Instructions for Firearms purchase.

1. Service members desiring to purchase a firearm must request a FB Form 1380 from the Provost Marshal Office (PMO) Police Services Section. The Police Services Section will, at time of the request, conduct a local Fort Bragg records check annotating violations, if any, on the form.
2. The service member will fill out Section II of the form and bring the form to his commander (O-3 or above). In the case of an O-1 or O-2 commander, a copy of their assumption of command must be attached to the form.
3. The commander will fill out section III with his approval/recommendation. The form is returned to the Police Services Section again for another local records check and PMO Stamp. Note: The commander is the approving authority for this action, the PMO is merely informing the commander of any record of violations on Fort Bragg. Commanders will retain a copy of this application in the soldiers file until PCS or ETS.
4. Service members with a stamped FB Form 1380 may now purchase a rifle or shotgun.
5. If purchasing a handgun, residents of Fort Bragg and Cumberland County must take the stamped FB Form 1380 to the Cumberland County Sheriff's department to apply for a Pistol Purchaser's Permit. The Sheriff's department is located in the Cumberland County Law Enforcement Center (next to the County Court House located at 131 Dick Street, Fayetteville, NC). The phone number is (910) 677-5576/5577. The applicant has 5 working days from issue of the FB Form 1380 to apply with the Sheriff's Department or the form will be considered expired. A service member residing in any county other than Cumberland must apply with their respective County Sheriff's Department within the same 5-day time limit.

APPENDIX C

PROCEDURES FOR STORAGE OF PRIVATELY OWNED WEAPONS IN UNIT ARMS ROOMS

The following procedures govern the control of privately owned weapons stored in arms rooms.

1. Accountability. Name, rank, and social security number of owner; and make, type, caliber, and serial number of the weapon will be entered on the bottom portion of the unit Master Authorization List. Weapons must be tagged with the above data for identification.

2. Inventories. Privately owned weapons and ammunition will be inventoried using the same standards and frequency required for government small arms and ammunition.

3. Storage. Privately owned weapons and ammunition will be maintained separately from military weapons and ammunition and in approved locked containers securely fastened to a fixed object in the arms room. Individuals will obtain written approval from their commander prior to storage of any privately owned weapon or ammunition in the arms room. The approval will be presented to the armorer who will retain a copy on file. The unit will sign a DA Form 2062, Hand Receipt, retaining a copy and giving the original to the owner. This document becomes the source document for accountability and inventories. The unit will also issue a DA Form 3749, Equipment Receipt, for each weapon stored in the arms room. As a general rule, storage of ammunition is limited to 50 rounds of ammunition per type of weapon. Soldiers requesting storage in excess of 50 rounds must obtain written approval of the unit commander.

4. Temporary removal. Individuals must obtain written authorization from the unit commander prior to removing privately owned weapons from the arms room. This authorization and the DA Form 3749 must be maintained in the arms room whenever a weapon is removed. The commander's authorization will be retained on file for 90 days after the weapon's return. The unit armorer will sign out weapons on Fort Bragg Form 2488-1, Weapons and Ammunition Control Log.

5. Permanent removal. Requests to permanently remove privately owned weapons from unit arms rooms require the commander's written approval. The owner of the privately owned weapon will complete a new DA Form 2062, Hand Receipt, acknowledging receipt of the weapon. Attach the final hand receipt and letter of authorization to the next monthly serial number inventory, and retain these two documents on file for 2 years.

6. Official and unofficial visitors to Fort Bragg may withdraw their weapons without prior approval from military authority but must conform to all other aspects of this regulation.
