

Italians help Americans on 'Black Friday'

FORWARD OPERATING BASE SALERNO, Afghanistan — The medical evacuation order was received in the afternoon of April 25. Six American servicemembers and one Afghan were injured in an ambush near Shkin — two of the casualties' injuries proved to be fatal.

Immediately after receiving the order, the personnel of the Forward Surgical Team readied themselves for the incoming casualties. Once the casualties were assessed, it was discovered that the hospital didn't have enough blood.

Word spread throughout the camp like wildfire, and within minutes, there was approximately 50 Italian soldiers ready to give blood to help the wounded American, who had been shot in the leg, said Sgt. 1st Class Philip Brewton, 946th FST, Mobile, Ala. The

BAGRAM, Afghanistan — Koreans, Thai and even American soldiers carried lanterns made out of noodle cups and paper and chanted a religious verse while filing down Disney Drive Thursday night.

They celebrated the birth of Buddha, who was born more than 2,600 years ago. His birthday falls on April 8 of the Lunar calendar and is called Vesak Day.

"The ceremony's purpose is to bless each member of the coalition forces and their families ... for people of Afghanistan and all the world to have peace," said Korean Lt. Col. Soomoon Chae, senior liaison officer, Combined Joint Task Force-180.

Sharon, Abbas plan to meet on peace 'road map'

JERUSALEM—Israeli Prime Minister Ariel Sharon and new Palestinian Prime Minister Mahmoud Abbas plan to meet this month to discuss the proposed “road map” to a final peace plan, Israeli and Palestinian officials said Sunday.

Meanwhile, an Israeli source said high-level security talks between Israeli and Palestinian officials — stalled since last year because of ongoing violence — resumed on Saturday. Mohammed Dahlan, the new Palestinian minister of state for security affairs, and Gen. Amos Gilad, who coordinates Israel’s activities in the Palestinian territories, met in Tel Aviv to resume the talks, the Israeli source said.

Palestinian Authority Foreign Minister Nabil Shaath told CNN that Abbas will urge Sharon to publicly accept the so-called road map, which Israel has not yet done, “and to start together to implement this road map — each of us implementing his share of these obligations and responsibilities.”

The meeting between the two prime ministers is planned to take place before Sharon’s planned trip to Washington, which is expected on May 20. Also on Sunday, the Israeli Defense Ministry said it will give 25,000 Palestinians permission to work in Israel and is releasing 180 prisoners as steps toward building trust with the Palestinians. Israel also announced that it will open borders for the movement of goods from the Palestinian territories into neighboring countries, including Egypt and Jordan.

The prisoners affected were taken into custody on nonviolent offenses — most for being in Israel illegally, an Israeli official said. Sixty-three

prisoners were released Sunday and the rest are scheduled for release Monday, the official said.

The details of the release were discussed in the unannounced meeting between Dahlan and Gilad.

The developments came as U.S. Secretary of State Colin Powell said Sunday that Israeli and Palestinian Authority leaders agree on enough points of the so-called road map to Mideast peace to move forward with its implementation.

Speaking at a news conference with Abbas in the West Bank town of Jericho, Powell said there was “sufficient agreement on the provisions within the road map so that we can get started.”

The road map is backed by the so-called Mideast Quartet — United States, the United Nations, Russia and the European Union. It is aimed at resolving the Israeli-Palestinian conflict and establishing a peaceful, democratic Palestinian state by 2005.

U.S. shakes up Iraq interim team

WASHINGTON—Retired Army Lt. Gen. Jay Garner, interim U.S. administrator of Iraq, will turn over command “within weeks” to former U.S. diplomat L. Paul Bremer III, appointed Tuesday as presidential envoy to the country, a senior Defense Department official said Sunday.

“It has been the plan all along that once Bremer got his feet on the ground” that Garner would give up his role, the official said.

Garner had said early on that he expected his term would last about three months, but this transition comes at a time that would cut that to about two months.

Bremer, a counterterrorism expert, was appointed presidential envoy by President Bush on Tuesday. In addition, Barbara Bodine, U.S. coordinator for central Iraq in charge of Baghdad, will leave her position Sunday after just three weeks on the job, a senior U.S. official said.

Bodine, who effectively was the interim mayor of Baghdad, will take a job at the State Department in Washington, and the move was not unexpected, the official said.

Meanwhile, U.S.-led coalition force commander Gen. Tommy Franks announced Sunday the end of Saddam Hussein’s Baath Party.

A coalition radio announcer Sunday read Franks’ statement in Arabic. “The Iraqi Baath Socialist Party is dissolved,” it said.



Marine killed by friendly fire was turning his life around

BOILING SPRINGS, S.C. — He was a young man who was struggling to better himself, but was cut down by an errant bomb in Iraq at the age of 20.

Just a few years ago, Pvt. Nolen Ryan Hutchings graduated from Boiling Springs High School outside of Spartanburg, S.C. The school celebrated his life recently, turning a classroom into a memorial for a Marine who gave his life for his country.

He was an average student, his teachers say, but one with a big smile and a big heart.

“He just never missed the opportunity to say a kind word or to let people know that he was thinking of them,” said Kerise Broome, his former English teacher.

Those who knew him say Hutchings, like so many teenagers, had his share of problems. Court records show he was arrested for trespassing and petty larceny while still in high school. But more importantly, his family said, toward the end of his life, Hutchings was trying to find his way.

“Typical problems, typical kid,” his adopted father Larry Hutchings said. “But when he did get into trouble, he settled his own mistakes.”

During his sophomore year in high school, he reached out to Northbrook Baptist Church in Boiling Springs for help. “He did it on his own,” his mother Carolyn Hutchings said. “No one pushed him into that. And every time their doors were open, he was there.” He joined a youth group with the church and went on a few missions to help spread the faith. But even there, church members confirm, he struggled. “He tried to do right,” member Craig Seay says. “He’s like you and me and everybody else, he messes up sometimes. But he tried to do the best he could.”

"Today is the first day in more than 100 years a public Buddhist ceremony took place in Afghanistan," said Chae, a follower of Buddhism.

Before Afghanistan was invaded, the country had a strong Buddhist influence.

The lantern parade commemorates part of the religion's history. The light from the lantern represents a blessing from the Buddha and light for the darkness, said Chae.

A prince of old India named Shakamoni started Buddhism. He visited a village and the villagers bought oil to light lanterns that symbolized welcoming the prince. An old, poor widow just managed to buy a lantern and oil by selling all of her belongings. By the time the prince arrived to the village there was a huge storm, which put out all the lanterns except for one small one – the old widow's. To this day the ceremony every year commemorates that one lantern, which stayed lit through the storm, said Chae.

Similar to the storm in the village, a huge gust of wind suddenly appeared directly after the ceremony ended. "It's a miracle," said Chae noting that the wind gusted after the ceremony's end.

Three Dharma teachers from Kabul came to lead the walk of Buddhists. The essence of Buddha's teachings is Dharma, which is

based on the law of release from suffering, leading to spiritual enlightenment.

For more information about Buddhism, famous Korean Buddhist leader, Bubyun Snim from India is scheduled to talk to servicemembers here about the Buddhist philosophy and how to become a master of one's mind.

He is scheduled to visit the Korean engineer compound at approximately 0500Z and hold a ceremony at the Enduring Faith Chapel at 0600Z May 23. The ceremony is open to all coalition members here.

gunshot had pierced his femoral artery.

“They just came out of the woodwork,” said Brewton. “It was amazing. I wasn’t the only one with a tear in my eye.”

Within minutes, the hospital had fresh blood. In the end they took and used 10 units. Many of the Italian soldiers waited for hours to help, and most were turned away.

“I felt it was my duty, but also a pleasure to help,” said Mattia Branco, 9th Alpini Regiment, Napoli, Italy. “He was a young boy out there, and we are all here working together for the same goal.”

His comrade Marizio Romano, 9th Alpini Regt. agreed. Another Italian soldier had told him about the 19-year-old soldier and his need for O positive blood.

“It was a duty for us,” Romano said. “His injury was very serious and he needed help. I would have done it for anyone who needed it.”

Romano also said it made him feel happy after he donated. He knew the soldier and considered him a friend as well as a good soldier.

While soldiers waited outside of the medical tent to help, the doctors inside were busy working miracles of their own. With the number of casualties, the American doctors knew they couldn’t do it alone. The Italians came to aid once again.

Italian Capt. Ferderco Lulardo, 9th Alpini Regt. was one of five doctors who worked to save lives on “Black Friday.”

“The medical team is a family,” he said. “It was the natural thing to do for the Americans. We are here with them working for a common goal.”

Another member of the medical family who helped was 1st Lt. Massimiliano Marchitello, 6th Pioneer Regiment, Rome, Italy; a young doctor, who always wears a blue surgical cap adorned with the American Flag. The cap was a gift from the last surgical team, the 909th FST, Fort Sheridan, Ill., and to him represents “an important sign of freedom.”

“My first thought was to save him,” Marchitello said of the soldier who needed blood. It was Marchitello who started to spread the word and organize the donation.

“We are brothers in arms,” he said. “We are here under the same flag.”

Chelsea is in; West Ham relegated

LONDON — West Ham was relegated after 10 years in the Premier League Sunday, while Chelsea took the final Champions League with a 2-1 victory against Liverpool.

West Ham tied 2-2 with Birmingham. The only way it could have stayed in the Premier League was to win and hope Bolton lost or tied against Middlesbrough. But Bolton, which staved off relegation, won 2-1. Sunderland and West Bromwich Albion already had been dropped.

Chelsea took fourth place for the final Champions League spot, winning at home on a goal by Jesper Gronkjaer. Both teams started the day with 64 points, but Chelsea had the better goal difference and needed only a tie to qualify for Europe's top club competition.

Manchester United sealed the championship last week for the eighth time in 11 seasons. Arsenal was assured second place and Newcastle third.

The last day of the 2002-03 season marked the final Premier League game for star goalkeeper Peter Schmeichel of Manchester City. Manchester City, playing its last game at Maine Road after 80 years, lost 1-0 to Southampton.

In other results, it was: Fulham 1, Charlton 0; Manchester United 2, Everton 1; Leeds 3, Aston Villa 1; Arsenal 4, Sunderland 0; Blackburn 4, Tottenham 0; and West Bromwich Albion 2, Newcastle 2.

Draw enough for Juve

TURIN, Italy — Juventus won the Italian title for the second straight year Saturday with a 2-2 draw against Perugia, securing its 27th championship with two games left in the season.

Second-placed Inter Milan, the only side who had a mathematical chance of catching Juve, drew 1-1 at home to Parma leaving them eight points adrift.

An injury-time equalizer from Perugia's Fabio Grosso slightly took the gloss of the occasion at the Delle Alpi stadium after Marco Di Vaio had put Juventus 2-1 up a minute into the second half.

Perugia striker Fabrizio Miccoli, on loan from Juve, had cancelled out David Trezeguet's 25th-minute opener from the penalty spot.

But Grosso's equalizer counted for nothing once news came through that Inter had been held.

Juve players danced around the field waving flags and then ran a lap of honor, joined by some of their families.

With Real Madrid at the Delle Alpi for a Champions League semi-final, second leg tie on Wednesday, Juve had asked fans not to invade the pitch as they usually do after winning the title and the appeal was heeded.

Juventus coach Marcello Lippi also had his mind on the tie with Real, in which his side trail 2-1 from the first leg, and he started several leading players, including Alessandro Del Piero and Pavel Nedved, on the bench.

AC Milan, who face Inter in the return game of their Champions League semi-final on Tuesday also fielded a weakened side and lost 1-0 at Brescia.

A win for Inter would have kept the title race alive for at least one more week but after Sierra Leone forward Mohammed Kallon had given Inter the lead at the break, Parma drew level through former Inter striker, Romanian Adrian Mutu.

Real Madrid suffers costly loss

MADRID — Real Sociedad moved above Real Madrid into second place behind leaders Deportivo Coruna after a 3-1 win over an in-form Real Mallorca in the first division on Sunday.

Deportivo knocked Real off the top on Saturday with a 2-0 victory over Malaga, while the former leaders were held to a goalless draw at lowly Recreativo Huelva.

With five games to go Depor and Sociedad both have 66 points but Javier Irureta's side is in first place thanks to its better record in matches between the two sides.

Former leaders Real, which has frittered away a four-point cushion at the top in just two games, is a point behind the leading pair on 65.

Celta Vigo, which was held to a 2-2 draw at home to Racing Santander earlier on Sunday, occupy the final Champions League slot in fourth place a further 11 points behind Real and one ahead of Valencia who lost 2-1 at home to Villarreal.

The Galicians looked on course for victory at the Balaidos stadium when midfielder Edu put them 2-1 up with a penalty five minutes from time.

But Racing refused to fold and substitute Diego Alonso headed an equalizer in the ninth minute of injury time that kept the Cantabrians clear of the relegation zone.

Beach volleyball tournament “serves” its purpose

BAGRAM, Afghanistan— Polish coalition forces led the way Sunday during the first American and coalition beach volleyball tournament.

Polish team no. 2 held the lead over their comrades, Polish team no. 1, taking the first two rounds of the final game to win the tournament.

Sixteen American and coalition teams consisting of Marines, Army, Slovakian and Polish forces signed up to compete in Sunday’s tournament, turning food, music and good old-fashioned sportsmanship into an all-day affair. According to the event coordinators, the tournament did more than “serve” its purpose.

“Command Sgt. Maj. (Steven) England decided there wasn’t enough interaction between the American and coalition forces, so I figured a volleyball tournament would be the perfect seasonal event to bring everyone together” said Andrew Solomon, Morale, Welfare and Recreation coordinator for Bagram. “It worked out well since (Jimmy) Sanchez was already planning something similar for the Marine and Army personnel.”

“I think this is a good way to bring the American forces together,” said Sanchez, one of the event coordinators, VMA 513th, Marine Support Squadron, Yuma, Ariz. “It’s a good way to boost morale and promote unit comradery.”

Even though the idea for the tournament was unanimously agreed upon by the coordinators and coalition forces, getting it started was easier said than done.

“The weather was a big problem,” said Solomon. “We had originally scheduled it for May 4, but we had to cancel it the day before due to strong winds.”

“Another problem was the language barrier,” Solomon added. “Being that the coalition forces involved in the tournament don’t speak English very well, explaining the game rules was somewhat difficult.”

The American teams involved in the tourna-

ment had some problems with the rules as well.

“Because we were playing with coalition forces we had to play by international rules which was something we had never done before,” said a member of Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 2nd Battalion, 505th Parachute Infantry Regiment, 82nd Airborne Division, Fort Bragg, N.C. volleyball team. “Things like a serve still being in play after hitting the net or playing rally games up to 25 points instead of 15 were things we had to adjust to.”

Despite the barriers in language and game rules, the tournament kicked off around 0500Z with the Marine and Company B, 527th Engineer Battalion teams starting the first game in the Marine compound’s pool A and the Slovakian and 527th teams in pool B, Slovakian Compound.

After a best two out of three single elimination game, both home teams in each pool were eliminated and Company B moved on.

Company B was soon eliminated in the next game with the other American teams falling out throughout the day leaving the Polish coalition teams 1 and 2 standing alone against each other in the final game of the tournament.

After a long day in the hot sun with bodies bruised and chaffed from the rough sand, Polish team 2 dominated the first two rounds of the final game eliminating their Polish comrades to win the tournament.

Although tired and hungry after a full day on the court, the winners and the runners up stood tall to receive their MWR-sponsored prizes. Desert camouflage gym bags were awarded to the 2nd place winners, and the champions received Operation Enduring Freedom backpacks with their most valuable player walking away with a CD player.

In the end, the coordinators said the tournament did more than serve its purpose of bringing units together.

“We had a great turnout today, a lot better than what I expected,” said Sanchez. “It would be nice to see units start their own leagues so we could do this more often.”

“I think this tournament was successful enough to have one weekly with a monthly championship tournament,” said Solomon. “It serves many purposes. Good physical training, unit comradery and something for troops to do to pass the time productively.”

Barcelona missed its chance to move into a UEFA Cup place after it turned in a disappointing performance and was held to a 0-0 draw at Sevilla.

The Catalans remained a point behind Athletic Bilbao in seventh.

Sociedad began positively as it went in search of an early goal at Son Moix against a Mallorca side that had taken impressive wins over title rivals Real Madrid and Deportivo in their last two games.

Midfielder Javi de Pedro should have done better when he sliced wide of the post in the third minute after Turkish forward Nihat Kahveci made a darting run down the right wing.

But the Spanish international soon made amends when he netted from the penalty spot on 10 minutes after Darko Kovacevic had tangled with Mallorca defender Poli as he bore down on goal.

Raynald Denoueix's side took control and extended their lead just over a quarter of an hour later when Russian midfielder Valery Karpin slotted home at the far post after defender Agustin Aranzabal had cut back a fine pass from the byline.

Powerful center forward Darko Kovacevic notched his 18th goal of the season to put Sociedad 3-0 up when he outjumped the Mallorca defense to head in a quickly-taken free kick from De Pedro nine minutes after the break.

Mallorca pulled one back six minutes later when the in-form Samuel Eto'o poked home at the far post after a Carlos cross was deflected off a defender but the Basque's side lead was never in serious danger.

At the other end of the table, basement club Rayo Vallecano look destined for relegation after only managing a 1-1 draw at home to Real Betis.

The modest Madrid-based side is now six points adrift of fellow strugglers Alaves and Recreativo Huelva.

Lyon earns Champions League spot Reuters

PARIS — Defending champion Olympique Lyon achieved one of its goals for the season when it beat Paris St. Germain 1-0 on Sunday to clinch a Champions League spot.

Sonny Anderson broke the deadlock with a fine shot in the 25th minute to take them back into top spot with a three-point lead over Monaco and just two games remaining.

Olympique Marseille, which slumped to a 3-0 defeat at Sochaux on Saturday, are in third five points adrift of the leaders.

Fourth-place Girondins Bordeaux trail Lyon by seven points and the reigning champion is now certain to finish in the top three to secure at least a place in the preliminary round of Europe's showcase competition.

With two games left at lowly Montpellier and against En Avant Guingamp, Lyon also look ideally placed to become the first team in a decade to retain its domestic crown.

It has 67 points from 36 matches ahead of Monaco (64), Marseille (62) and Bordeaux (60).

"We did not mean to be flamboyant, we did what we had to do," said Lyon coach Paul Le Guen.

Their performance was far from perfect but Anderson, whose goal was his 70th for Lyon, was again decisive.

The veteran Brazilian, set up by Philippe Violeau, tried his luck from afar and caught PSG goalkeeper Jerome Alonzo off his guard with a powerful shot into the corner.

"We must all be at our best until the end of the season if we want to go all the way," Anderson said, refusing to be singled out for his performance.

"It's always great to play tense games like this in front of your home crowd," he added.

The goal did not seem to do Lyon much good as PSG took control of the game in the second half but was too clumsy in front of goal to equalize.

Monaco had kept the pressure on Lyon on Saturday with a 3-1 win over Montpellier, Congo's Shabani Nonda scoring both the equalizer and the winner from the principality team.


Nonda leads the goalscorers list with 22 ahead of Bordeaux's Pedro Pauleta, who scored his 21st in his team's 2-0 victory over Le Havre on Saturday.

The Portuguese striker was voted best player in Ligue 1 by his fellow professionals for the second year in succession on Sunday.

Troyes, beaten 1-0 at RC Lens on Saturday, was relegated to Ligue 2 four years after making it back to the top flight.

The Ligue 1 title will be decided over a four-day period from May 20-24, while Monaco and Sochaux will battle it out in the League Cup final at the Stade de France on Saturday.
